
### Role Play for Stakeholder Engagement

Mme Jocelyn runs a small shop with her brother, Jason, selling stationery (paper, pens, books, envelopes). Their father started the shop twenty years ago and has recently died. There are opportunities for expansion of their business because the shop next door is up for sale. Jason has done a marketing survey and found that there is demand for other items, such as phones, as well as for photocopying and printing documents. He sees this as the opportunity they need to grow the business. If they take out a loan, he has worked out that it will take just a few years to pay it back.




However, Jocelyn does not want to take out a loan and does not want to talk about it with her brother. Jason has asked you to help him find a way forward with Jocelyn.


Figure 1: Differentiating Crisis Management, Stakeholder Management and Stakeholder Engagement



### Reaching Agreement. Finding Consensus



"I fully support the proposal and am willing to be part of implementing it."

"I agree with the principle but have some problems with the proposal, but I'll go along with it. I can live with it."

"I can't support this proposal because... but I don't want to stop the process, so go ahead without me"

"I disagree with the core of the proposal because .... has not been resolved. We need to look for a new proposal."
